Morsi Gets Ultimatum From Military

CAIRO—Thousands of protesters erupted into cheers after Egypt's military leaders warned that they would intervene if the president failed to resolve a political crisis within 48 hours, raising the prospect of a military coup a day after millions of Egyptians thronged the country's streets
